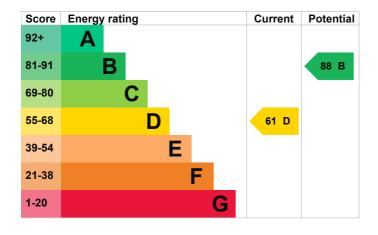
Properties can be let if they have an energy rating from A to E.

Primary energy use

How this affects your energy bills

7. Solar water heating	£4,000 - £6,000	£73
8. Replace single glazed windows with low-E double glazed windows	£3,300 - £6,500	£109
9. Solar photovoltaic panels	£3,500 - £5,500	£468
